## Master Board News

**Lou True, President...Association Manager:** I regret to report that Jose Ponton,

our manager throughout 2011, has left WP&M—and us—for greener pastures. Our new association manager is Scott Colville, who will also manage several of our condominium associations. Scott is not new to Snowden Overlook, having managed Villas I previously. Please join me in welcoming Scott back to S.O

**Pool:** We plan to open the pool earlier in May this year, thanks to our new pool heater. Until Memorial Day, however, we expect that the pool will be open primarily to residents only, as it was last September. Before Memorial Day, any opportunities to take guests to the pool are likely to be limited to weekend periods when a lifeguard is present. Watch for notices of the final dates, times and other details for the new season.

**Security:** In this newsletter Jeff Medwid, Security columnist, will report on advances made in our Security here at S.O. Many thanks to our Security Committee for their work on all aspects of security in our community.

**Resident Data Base:** Expect to receive a request for resident information which is intended to assist our management company in serving residents. Among other things, we expect to be requesting that all residents register their “swipe” cards that open the Clubhouse doors and pool gate as well as the vehicle transponders that open the entrance gates. Over the years, some cards and transponders have been lost or changed hands, and records are incomplete. This will allow us to identify all cards and transponders that are in the proper hands. Once all have had ample opportunity to register our cards/transponders, the association plans to disable all those that are not registered.

**Concrete:** Some time this spring, we expect that the new sidewalks and curbs at the entrance to the Clubhouse will be removed by



the contractor and replaced with higher-quality concrete.

SnowdenOverlook.com has several tools for communicating with the Clubhouse Office and with other residents of the community. These tools can be used to contact Clubhouse staff, and after-hour emergency personnel. Links for the tools are located at the top of each page of the website.

The contact information includes management companies and their staff, and board members and officers of each association. guardhouse. One is a super high-speed camera that will capture the license plate number of all vehicles entering S.O., no matter what the speed (up to 100 mph if necessary). The other two overview cameras capture all activity going thru both the In and Out gates as well as the activities of the guards walking in and out of the guardhouse. Five S.O. residents including Carol and me were trained how to use the equipment. We were all impressed how clear the video pictures are.

The SOCA board has approved the installation of 5 video cameras to monitor the Clubhouse. They are scheduled to be installed by Vector Security within the next week. Vector was chosen because they had installed the original 3 cameras that are now there, monitoring the pools and gym. The new cameras will be added to the existing system. The cameras will monitor the front door to the Clubhouse, the theatre area, the restrooms, the banquet room and the main, fireplace room.

Therefore, the addition of these cameras at both the guardhouse and Clubhouse will add significantly to the security of the entire community. The Security Committee will evaluate the effect from these cameras closely over the next few months and will work closely with the SOCA board to determine if any further security measures are necessary, such as speed bumps and 24/7 gate operations.

Wow! Have we been blessed with the weather this winter—so far. March has been known to send us some big surprises, and this reminds me to remind YOU all about our car care. I know we all have had our tires



inspected and replaced. Still, on the must-do list is windshield washer fluid, wiper blades, oil and filter change. When the dealership is doing your oil change and has your auto up on a lift, ask—*insist*—they inspect the entire undercarriage of your auto for damage to the transmission case, oil pan and gasoline tank for dents, cracks, etc. Also have them check cv joints and boots, and if your auto is 0 years old, or you have over 100,000 miles on it, they should inspect the frame and undercarriage for rust.

While the hood is open, they also should inspect all hoses and belts, and an often-forgotten gasoline filter that will fill with enough moisture that it will freeze and you will not have fuel going past it to the engine. The result: the car does not run, or while you are driving it stutters, loses power and leaves you stranded. Also have them do a test on your battery to make sure it's charged to the highest level it can go where it will hold a charge. Otherwise, you may be left stranded with a car that won't start and may have to walk a distance for help in cold, windy weather [*Right, Fern?? My fault; I should have done what I was supposed to do!*]

Also, when the weather is nice, you could put a coat of wax on your car in the garage where the sheet metal is warm enough for wax. Best to all.

Berries are delicious, but they're also

kind of delicate. Raspberries in particular seem like they can mold before you even get them home from the market. There's nothing more tragic than paying \$4 for a pint of local raspberries or strawberries only to look in the fridge the next day and find that fuzzy mold growing on them. Here is a tip about preventing the mold and keeping them fresh longer.

*Wash them with vinegar.* When you get your berries home, prepare a mixture of one part vinegar (white works best) and ten parts water. Dump the berries into the mixture and swirl around. Drain, rinse if you want (though the mixture is so diluted, you can't taste the vinegar), and pop them in the fridge. The vinegar kills any mold spores and other bacteria that might be on the surface of the fruit, and "voila"!

Raspberries will last a week or more, and strawberries go almost two weeks without getting moldy and soft.

TAKE INVENTORY...If the worst happens and your home is destroyed, "the settlement of your claim will be 10 times faster if you have an inventory of your home."

As important as it is, the idea of recording everything you own can feel overwhelming. Here's help:

- KEEP IT SIMPLE. Videotape your belongings while describing what they are, where you got them, and their value. Don't forget to shoot inside closets. Other good options: take digital photos and store them on a CD



or use a computer program.

- **WORK ROOM BY ROOM.** You don't need to get it done in one day. Keep at it, even if it takes several days or weekends.
- **SHUN ALL-OR-NOTHING THINKING.** It's OK if you've lost model numbers and receipts. The goal is to identify as many items as possible as best you can.
- **PROTECT THE RESULTS.** Store the inventory in a secure location away from home, preferably a safe-deposit box.
- **MAKE UPDATES.** Take stock at least every five years, and add any major purchases right away.

“OPEN SESAME”...or How the Gate Knows to Open for you...

Putting aside those times when the gate opens for no one, the method used to operate the gates at Snowden Overlook is quite intriguing. It is based on a technology called RFID (pronounced ARE-FID), which stands for Radio Frequency Identification. This technology can be traced back to World War II and the identification Friend or Foe system, developed by Scottish physicist, Sir Robert Alexander Watson-Watt (who also developed RADAR), and used to distinguish good planes from bad.

RFID is an automatic identification technology for uniquely identifying an “object”

(your car) using a “tag” (your transponder) that carries a unique identification “(your status as a resident of Snowden Overlook).

A basic RFID system has three parts: a scanning antenna; a transceiver with a decoder to interpret data (these two are combines at S.O. in the gray device to the left of the entrance gate); and a transponder that has been programmed with encoded digital data (the “tag” in your windshield).

The scanning antenna puts out radio-frequency signals. The RF radiation does two things: it provides a means of communicating with the transponder and it provides the transponder with the energy to communicate. This is an absolutely key part of the technology; RFID tags do not need to contain batteries, and can therefore remain usable for very long period of time—maybe decades.

Put simply, RFID is similar to bar code technology, like at Target or Safeway, but uses radio waves to capture data from tags rather than optically scanning the bar codes on a label. Some day in the near future all this data may be placed in a small capsule implanted in your arm...or is that too ‘Twilight Zone’ for now?

**DISHWASHER AIRGAP...** You may not know what it's called, but you've seen it a thousand times: that little chrome “mushroom” on the kitchen sink next to the faucet. It's called an air gap, and it prevents the backflow of dirty water into the dishwasher. When the dishwasher drains, it pumps the dirty water up to this air gap. The



water then makes a U-turn and is routed down a drain line. This provides a physical break or “air gap” that prevents dirty water from flowing back into the dishwasher.

If the dishwasher was connected directly to the disposal, a plugged drain could easily force wastewater into the dishwasher. Since the air gap is placed above the sink, any wastewater will now back up into the sink instead.

Sometimes the air gap leaks when the dishwasher drains. This happens if the gap is dirty or there are restrictions in the drain line between the air gap and the sink drain. To fix it, slide off the chrome cover of the air gap and clean the plastic parts. You can often remove the internal plastic cover and clean it, too. Also, look at the drain line (probably a rubber hose) beneath the air gap. Remove any kinks, and replace the hose if it is damaged.
